Former Wildcat brings plenty of enthusiasm to the program

BUNN -- Players aren't the only people who need to make adjustments when a new high school football coaching staff is implemented.

Sometimes, it's also the coaches.

Such was the case last season when Andre' Davis was selected as the new head grid coach at Bunn High School -- his alma mater.

Davis was a star quarterback during some of the Bunn glory days before heading off to Elon and Campbell to compete on the collegiate level.

Davis surrounded himself with like-minded assistants, most of whom had also played at BHS under either David Howle or Chris Miller -- or both.

But the incoming staff received a bit of a reality check when they quickly realized that some of the givens and expectations of the past were no longer in place.



Red Rams looking to build on gridiron

FRANKLINTON -- Ask any expert, and they'll be quick to tell you the importance of continuity in building a successful high school

football program.
Such is the case at Franklinton, which has boasted a myriad of quality players and coaches through the years.

Of course, players come and go, but so have the coaches -- and there have been some really good

Franklinton hopes that problem will be remedied with the hiring of Michael Justice in the off-season.

Justice becomes the (brace for it) ninth head coach at FHS over the past 30 years -- an extremely high turnover rate, especially given the importance of maintaining continuity.

With each step forward the program seems to

make, there has been a coaching change, and the process inevitably starts

Justice is committed to Franklinton for the longterm, and there's plenty of reason for him to do that, considering the Red Rams' successful feeder programs and yearly incoming influx of talented young performers. FHS will have a nice

mix of youth and veterans as part of this year's club, which is off to an 0-2 start, but showed significant progress during a nearmiss loss against Apex in the regular season opener.

Franklinton then went on the road last week and was topped at South Central in a strange game filled with poor weather and lengthy delays.

For Justice and Company, the non-league schedule is a brutal one -- and things don't get any easier once Big East Conference action begins in

Consider this -- three of the league juggernauts (Northern Nash, Southern Nash and Rocky Mount) have played four times for a state crown in the past 10 years, and Rocky Mount has won one of

Realignment will come next year, but Justice's initial campaign will see the Red Rams once again picked fourth in the fourteam Class 3-A portion of the Big East behind the aforementioned Nash

County juggernauts.
But FHS has pulled off upsets against those clubs in the past, notably a stun-ner over Rocky Mount three years ago. And the Red Rams were able to control Northern Nash during the Jimmy Williams Era, but that was before the Knights hit their stride in recent sea-

Franklinton has some solid returnees such as Chan Thomas, Elijah Ellison, Trey Macholl and tackling machine Ray Crudup, among many

Alijah Durham, who saw some spot varsity duty in 2023, will be Franklinton's chief running back.

James and Durham certainly have genetics on their side as their fathers -- Kevin James and Donnell Durham -- were stars on some of the great Bunn clubs in the late 1990s.

Franklinton's defense should be stingy, so if the Red Rams can score some points out of their spread offense, they could very much be a surprise this fall in what should be a powerful Big East Confer-

DONDRE ALLEN EMERGED LAST FALL FOR LOUISBURG Warriors will lack experience once again during '24 season

LOUISBURG -- Strange as it may sound, it's as if a time capsule landed at Louisburg High School and took away two consecutive senior classes from the Warriors' football program.

Last year, the Warriors had only five seniors on their roster -- but quality certainly trumped quantity in the form of nowgraduated greats Donte' Štrickland, Anthony Carter and Isaiah Eddie.

As good as those players were, it takes 22 to fill out a starting lineup, which meant several underclassmen were thrown into the fire early in their respective varsity careers.

Because of that, Louisburg got off to a slow start, but those youngsters

paign went on -- so much so that the Warriors eventually reached the second round of the Class 2-A State Playoffs -- and came within a two-point conversion of making it all the way to the third round.

Those seniors are now gone, so it would be expected that this year's Warriors would have a deep senior class.

Right? Wrong.

Again, Louisburg has just five seniors on its roster, but here's the good part -- because of what happened last year, LHS has a more experienced lineup than what its roster would initially say, thanks in part to so many freshman and sophomores competing on the varsity in 2023 while literally

Despite losing the likes of Strickland, Carter and Eddie, LHS is strong once again at the skill positions, led by Michah McKnight.

McKnight saw plenty of action in 2023, especially when Louisburg went to a power package to make the best use of Strickland's running abilities.

And with Carter needing rest between playing so many snaps on offense and defense, Dondre Allen emerged as a highquality running back as a ninth-grader.

McKnight and Allen are back this fall, and both played key roles in last week's 21-14 road decision against former league opponent Southeast Hali-

Trailing heading into the fourth quarter, Louisburg delivered unanswered points as McKnight rushed for 80 yards to go with a pair
